

Quiet wolves have ears.

Here the word 'quiet' is an adjective describing wolves.

Quiet! wolves have ears.

The exclamation mark turns the word 'quiet' into a verb meaning 'Be quiet!'

The wolf grabs Red Hoodie's bag and gobbles up the cake and cookies and candy, and leaves.

The comma placed after 'candy and before 'leaves' is a separator creating a new clause. The word 'leaves' changes from a noun like cake, cookies, candy into a verb meaning 'to leave.'

Let's eat, Granny

Adding a comma turns 'let's eat' into a command and Granny becomes the person addressed.

Don't eat Granny

Without a comma after 'eat', Granny is the object of the verb 'to eat' and in danger of being eaten!
